What to watch while sheltering at home?

We are curating a list of films that are not only entertaining, but have meaning. The idea is that if you can spare a couple of hours—or less—you can watch films that feature an aspect of liberty or free-market thinking. In these times, such old-fashioned notions need a good airing.

We plan to make the entire list available soon, so here's a taste of what to expect. These are some of our favorites, some dramas, some comedies, and are presented in no special order.

Fahrenheit 451, the 1966 movie based on the Ray Bradbury novel, presents a future where "controversial" books are forbidden by the government, and firemen have much different jobs than you might expect. Some brave souls react to the ban.

Pick either *All the President's Men* (1976) or *The Post* (2017) to get two versions of the same events, both reminding us how important freedom of the press really is.

For movies with individualism as an underlying theme, try *Fountainhead* (1949) or the futuristic *THX 1138* (1971). Similar theme, very different approaches.

Need to have your faith in our democracy uplifted? Try Mr. Smith Goes to Washington (1939), as it's a classic. A lesser-known though great film is Born Yesterday (1950). It's comic-drama featuring Judy Holliday as the ditsy blonde who gets educated about the importance of democracy.

For some laughs, try *The Castle* (1997). This Australian film follows the struggles of a home owner, whose property stands in the way of progress. It's eminent domain vs. the little guy with a perfect ending.

For a more current entry that champions entrepreneurship and competition, you can't go wrong with *Ford vs. Ferrari* (2019).
